A Letter to the Welham Weather Gods


Dear Esteemed God of Weather,

The German Sadists

Did you catch yourself relishing juicy gossip in the last issue's 'Socials' article? Or secretly felt joy when the class topper scored a little lower than usual? That deep, twisted satisfaction and pleasure at the misfortune of others, dear readers, is referred to as schadenfreude. Derived from German origins, schadenfreude combines the words 'schaden' meaning damage, and 'freude' meaning joy.



From global competitions to gossip magazines, schadenfreude is a hidden part of many of our cherished communal rituals. A 2015 study in Würzburg, Germany found that football fans smiled more quickly and broadly when their rival team missed a penalty, than when their own team scored. The Japanese have a saying for this: "The misfortune of others tastes like honey." People often feel good about their own failures when they find out that others have failed the same way. It is validation to them, as they measure their goodness by comparing themselves to other people, rather than measuring their actions against their own values and principles.

While schadenfreude does sound like a questionable human trait, it is actually the consequence of several deep-ly-ingrained psychological processes that have evolved in our brains over millions of years. It emerges from three primary concerns: self-evaluation or self-esteem (feeling better about oneself by lowering another), social identity (identifying with a group with exclusion of others), and justice (feeling that somebody received the consequences of their action). When people tend to make mockery a habit, the logical and reasoning part of the prefrontal cortex gets suppressed, leading us to act on our most primitive emotions. Due to this, dopamine delivery from our limbic system can eventually corrode one's ability to empathise, thus causing the feeling of pleasure at someone else's gaffes.

The author of 'When Bad Things Happen To Other People' John Portmann says that although schadenfreude might be a morally grey feeling, it is a very common human experience. Moreover, all our emotions that psychologists call 'cognitive' are not simply reflex reactions to external triggers, but complex processes requiring us to appraise and judge our relationship with the world around us and tailor our responses accordingly. Borrowing from a message from *Pixar's Inside Out 2 (because pop culture is the only way Welhamites can relate to things)*, emotions like schadenfreude are meant to be felt, not 'bottled'.

The 18th Lok Sabha: 2024 Election Analysis

In a year defined by elections, the citizens of India joined the democratic circus as they went to the polls for the 2024 elections in a compelling display of power and democratic engagement. In a masterclass of political strategy and manipulation—the very hallmark of every democracy—what emerged was an excellent demonstration of the theatrical and constantly evolving nature of Indian politics. This election was unlike any before, featuring everything from dancing caricatures of politicians to the rise of new godly avatars and even audacious claims of stopping an international war.



Whether it be clashes over BJP's '400 par' hustle or narratives of the apparent death of the constitution, the will of the people prevailed. Even as every household in India contemplated the potential fundamental threat these elections posed to the democratic fabric of our country during the buildup, the 2024 Lok Sabha Elections revealed the true bearing of what had come upon them, and what we believe was for the best.

India has over 986 million registered voters, who were eligible to exercise their right to franchise to determine the composition of their government during the six-week long elections. Out of these, 640 million Indians cast their votes, with the BJP, together with its National Democratic Alliance winning a majority. Though the NDA did manage to secure its victory, it was a partial one, securing a mere 293 seats, 107 seats short of their massive goal.


This unexpected upset did come as a surprise to the numerous pundits who believed in the problematic exit polls. There are multiple reasons as to why many underestimated the INDIA bloc. But some explanations provided for thier own partial victory, is that they used the right strategy in emphasising social justice and the caste census, stitching up more astute coalitions and making sharper candidate choices in terms of caste.

There is no doubt that the recognition of the need for social justice as well as the fears about the survival of the Constitution were significant factors. Political manipulation seemed to reach its peak, with the Election Commission issuing warning to adhere to the Moral Code of Conduct. One example of this is reflected in the ideological defeat for the ruling party with their loss in Faizabad. It was assumed that Ayodhya would be a guaranteed win for the NDA after the inauguration of the Ram Mandir; however, that ended up not being the case. The results led to speculations around the visibly diluted role of previously prominent leaders such as UP Chief Minister Yogi. Political analysts and multiple surveys credited the loss of BJP's majority to unemployment. The youth came out in protest of the lack of job opportunities and funding that has been provided. This prominent lack of youth engagement was recognised in the special attention given to increasing employment and skill development in the 2024 Union Budget. With the echoes of unemployment, inflation, land acquisition and talk of 'changes in the Constitution,' the real question became the reason why the presumption of 'guarenteed wins' were made to begin with?

Local factors in different states also played an important role in the result of the elections, as the BJP, on its own, stopped short of a majority mark with 240 wins. This resulted in Chandrababu Naidu and Nitish Kumar becoming kingmakers—propping up PM Modi in his third term.

Further, the election results unleashed a mass wave of emotional and financial agitation among the masses, with the elections coming as a negative surprise for the Indian stock market, with the frontline indices, Sensex and Nifty 50, crashing over 6% each when the votes were being counted.

The 2024 Verdict is as much about the INDIA bloc story. Defying all predictions, the Opposition put up a power fight and claimed 233 seats.



The Congress party almost doubled its 2019 tally, grabbing 99 seats. Somehow this meant that the entire country was celebrating as both the I.N.D.I.A and the NDA coalitions found themselves at the doorstep of victory (even if one was self-proclaimed).


